## Customs DG restrained in Lamborghini case

The Court of Appeal yesterday restrained the operation of the letter dated May 26, 2015 signed by Director General of Customs, written to Euro Sports Auto Lanka Private Limited, stating that the request for re-exporting the Lamborghini vehicles has been turned down.

The aforesaid letter further directed the petitioner to pay all applicable taxes for vehicles within ten days, of the date stated.

The respondents, the Director General of Customs and K. G. Jayawardene the superintendent of Customs were restrained also from claiming and receiving any sum of money on the bank guarantee of the petitioner.

The petitioner had said that it was imperative that he re-export the vehicle, immediately to comply with the requests of the principals of the petitioner. If the petitioner was unable to do so, substantial injury would be caused to the petitioner, in that on the one hand there was no prospective buyer for the vehicles locally. The petition was supported by Manoj Bandara, appearing with Lakshman Perera, instructed by Sudath Perera Associates.

The Bench comprised Justice Vijith Malalgoda, the President of the Court of Appeal.
